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2311. Family Preservation Funds

A. Program 521 – Prevention of Unnecessary Out-of-Home Placement (PUP).

- 1. PUP funds are used to ensure the protection and safety of a child at risk of maltreatment.
- 2. PUP provides financial assistance, temporary child care, counseling, drug screens, substance abuse assessments, medical/dental services, psychological evaluations and transportation services to families with children at risk of placement into foster care or who are ready for reunification.
- 3. Rent, utility bills, temporary day care and drug screens are expenditures that are frequently paid with PUP funds.
- 4. PUP funds have limited and/or restricted budgets.

B. Program 551 – Early Intervention and Prevention

- 1. Early Intervention and Prevention funds should be used to help families where abuse or neglect has been substantiated, but there is a low risk for a repeat incident or for families where abuse or neglect has been screened out or unsubstantiated (services to priority two families would be voluntary in nature).
- 2. This program is intended to provide services that will help increase the strength and stability of the family, increase parent confidence/competence in their parenting abilities and to enhance family functioning to prevent child abuse and neglect.
- 3. Early Intervention funds have limited and/or restricted budgets. At this time these funds can not be transferred to any other program.

C. Program 571 – Homestead

1. Homestead funds should be used to assure safety for children in CPS or PLC cases through the purchase of intensive, in-home counseling where children are at risk of an unnecessary foster care placement or who are ready for reunification.

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2. Services purchased should allow children to remain safely with relatives and prevent unnecessary foster care placements.

- 3. Total expenditures should NOT exceed \$3,500.00 per family unless specifically approved by the Social Services Section.
- 4. Homestead funds have limited and/or restricted budgets.

D. Program 573 – Parent Aide

- 1. Parent Aide funds should be used to provide parent education, training and support to families through classes and in-home visitation. The goal is to ensure the safety and protection of children.
- 2. Total expenditures should NOT exceed \$3,000 per family unless specifically approved by the Social Services Section.
- 3. Parent Aide funds have limited and/or restricted budgets.

Currently PUP, Parent Aide, Homestead and Early Intervention budgets can be transferred between each other.
